We're back to partying, Zoom style!


Members will be randomly assigned to small group chat rooms and given a discussion question. Each room assignment will last 10 minutes, then we'll all be rearranged again and given a new question.

Education Corner: The History of Flannel

The History of Flannel

If there is one fabric that reminds me of winter and the holiday season, it would have to be flannel. Flannel is so much more than just a plaid fabric. As noted on the website: <u>The History of Flannel - Gear Patrol</u>:

"Flannel first emerged in the 17th century, created by the Welsh as a replacement to their plain wool garb. Made out of worsted yarn, napped on one or both sides, and sourced from the country's multitudinous herds of sheep, the fabric provided much better protection against the Welsh's notoriously wet and windy winters; it's unclear who named the stuff, but the French called it *flanelle*, the Germans, *Flanell*. Because of its durability, affordability and warmth, flannel quickly became popular across European borders. Wool factories sprouted up all over England and France. In 1889 American entrepreneur Hamilton Carhartt, seeing the need to improve the working man's uniform in the United States, opened his factory in Detroit, MI and started producing tough flannel garments."

Soon flannel became synonymous with the outdoors and the rugged work shirt, but today flannel is even used in high fashion garments. Check out the rest of the story on the website above.

Oregon Garden Retreat

The Retreat is only a couple of months away! The dates/times are Friday, February 25 @ 8:00am through Sunday, February 27 @ 2:00pm.

At this time, we have forty members registered to attend and one person on the waitlist. There are sometimes last minute cancellations, due to unforeseen circumstances, so if you are still thinking about going to this popular retreat at the beautiful Oregon Garden Resort, I encourage you to go ahead and <u>register</u>. Any available spots will be offered to people on the waitlist, in the order they signed up. A \$50 registration fee is required at the time of <u>registration</u> to hold your place in line,

If you are on the waitlist and unable to attend the retreat when a spot is offered, or there are no available spots, your deposit will be refunded. The total cost to attend is \$250 for a shared room, if one is available, or \$370 for a single room. This includes breakfast on Saturday and Sunday, a catered lunch on Friday and Saturday and unlimited use of the sewing room from 8:00am on Friday until 2:00pm on Sunday.

For our members who are already registered to attend, Carol Sayles has sent out reminder emails to now pay the remaining balance due, if any. Payment in full must be RECEIVED no later than Wednesday, January 5.

To briefly outline the guidelines that will ensure a safe environment, as much as possible, for everyone:

- 1. The retreat is limited to forty attendees, in order to give each sewing spot as much space as possible, with a minimum of 6 feet.
- 2. Full vaccination status or a valid medical exemption are encouraged for all attendees.
- 3. The Resort requires that masks be properly worn at all times when in the main building, including our sewing room, unless actively eating or drinking. (Any change in the Governor's mandates or the Resort's requirements will, of course, be implemented accordingly.)

Join Our First-Ever WQG Quilt-Along!

We've decided to try something new for 2022 - we are going to have a guild-wide quilt along!

We are still considering themes, but the basic idea is that we will send out two block patterns each month via our email distribution list, and guild members will sew along using their own choice of fabrics. The program will run January-June, so at the end of June you will have (12) 12.5" (unfinished) blocks to put together into a quilt of your own design.

We are still working out the details of possibly using some charity fabrics, so that the finished quilt top and back will go to our Charity committee for quilting and distribution.

Joyce Greenfield will coordinate this program and will make up sample blocks every month. More details will be announced at the December meeting and in future issues of the Wednesday Patch and Newsletter.



History Mystery Part 8: Education

In 2008, Marcia Gilliland and her committee wrote a program on the history of quilting, which has been presented many times to area schools, churches, and other groups. This was shown at Vernonia High where we taught a multi-week course on quilting. Students hand-stitched blocks, and our members completed the quilt which was then donated to the school. In later years a Gee's Bend -style quilt was made and it won a blue ribbon at the county fair. This collaboration was repeated for several years. We have also taught quilting skills at area schools, at Showtime at Shute Park in the summer, and at The Saturday Hillsboro Farmers Market. Our 2010 Connections exhibit at Washington County Museum, now Five Oaks Museum, included an education corner where kids of all ages could arrange quilt squares, quilt on a frame, and much more. Demos have been held at the Washington County Fair, Washington County Museum, and other community events.

Our guild has staged two Quilt Documentation Days with The Oregon Quilt Project. Participants signed up in advance to bring one or more quilts to have photographed and evaluated and then included in Oregon's online quilt registry. The first was held at PCC Rock Creek in 2010, with the second in 2014 at Washington County Museum downtown. Each quilt requires a half hour to document, with about twenty-five quilts done each day. Information about all the Quilt Project quilts will be available at the International Quilt Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska, www.internationalquiltmuseum.org.

Another group with whom we have collaborated for several years is Adelante Mujeres of Forest Grove. Their mission is working to build a more just society by empowering Latinas to lead. Beginning in 2010, we have created several quilting activities for their group to teach them new skills. Those in the first series of classes made felt banners to hang in the Adelante offices, followed by a class to make blocks for a quilt. Then classes were taught twice with their children's division, Adelante Chicas, having them make blocks for quilts as well.

A few years ago, our own Alicia Johnson started the Sewing for Others Club at the International School of Beaverton for middle school students. They learned hand sewing basics and embroidery. With the Siegel Grant obtained through our guild, Alicia was able to provide a sewing machine, and with more supplies donated by our members, to help students learn how to make more with quilting fabric, like baby blankets and book bags for the Portland Book Bank organization. Last year, the club met over zoom and a few times in person. Students helped each other to learn to crochet and knit. Some made pillowcases which were donated, and some made masks or items to decorate their rooms or to give to siblings. Follow them on Instagram @sewingforothers and watch their progress as they continue to be creative and learn new crafty skills.

Most recently we have made a climate change quilt with Bag & Baggage Theater consisting of twenty blocks expressing our thoughts on climate change. The top was shown this past Saturday at the Vault Theater, along with readings from climate change themed plays, and a presentation from Washington County 350, our local chapter of 350pdx.org. Once quilted, thanks to Chase Lawrence, it will go on to be shown at the upcoming climate change symposium to be held in May 2022 at Lewis and Clark College.

Last, but not least, our own workshops and programs have been ongoing since our formation. Starting with self-produced programs and quick-make projects, we've now progressed to multi-month projects, challenges, and nationally regarded speakers. A special thank you goes out to all who have served to bring us quality programming.

Confessions of a Cheap Quilter

When the pandemic hit, and no one was trudging out to their local fabric stores to find JUST the right red, we were forced into, sometimes unwelcome, innovation and creativity in our quilting. For me, that innovation came in the form of pieced backings.

My sophomore geometry teacher, Mrs. Korkowski, would be the first to tell you that I am extremely math challenged. Therefore, for me, backings have always consisted of two 40" wide fabric lengths (of course, on clearance!) sewn together...end of story. When emergency trips to the fabric store became verboten, necessity became the mother of invention. I was forced to learn how to piece backings.

Recently, as I have shared my multi-colored, mismatched backings, the majority response from fellow quilters has been, "I've always wanted to try that, but it looks like such a hassle." Hey, if this girl who nearly flunked geometry can do it, so can you.

Where to start? Most quilters know that you want your backing to be 4-6 inches bigger (width and length) than your quilt top. I start with the length. My quilt top is 81" X 65". In the first photo, I show a panel of pin-wheels, leftovers from the quilt top – pieced together, they measure 85 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". I'm safe! I know that each pinwheel block is 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ " (weird size). I'll use the remaining 3 blocks (39") to expand the width. I sew two light blue lengths to the 85 $\frac{1}{2}$ " pinwheel strip – it is now 31" wide. 31 + 39 = 70. I need 69" width. I'm safe!

How to fill in the rest? My method is 6-12-24. I love my 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square ruler. If I don't have a big enough scrap for 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", I sew together four 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks. This is about the only time you have to match seams. These 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks, added to the length of my 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square leftovers, give me more width. I need about 8 more inches, so I cut some light blue and teal lengths. Almost there. Whoops, I cut the white top rectangle 2" too short. No big deal. I cut another teal 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ' strip and we're good.

A few final tips: Press seams open whenever you can to avoid bulk. Note, in the final photo, that there are uneven edges on the bottom and right. Not to worry; these will be cut when the finished quilted piece is trimmed...or you can chop "em off. I mark the even top of my backing "TOP" for the machine quilter. Remember, if there is a fabric you love, don't put it on the outside edges. It will likely get hacked off in the trim-

ming. Avoid running seams too close to the edge. Trust me, stitching binding through that added seam is a pain in the butt. On the sample, when I cut the white too short, I put the teal emergency strip on the inside. Don't be afraid to incorporate orphan blocks, panels, or wall hanging tops that will never be quilted.

Huge kudos to AnnMarie Cowley, my talented, kind and forgiving machine quilter, who has persisted these past 2 years despite my innovations. You make me look good.



Guild Challenge Quilt: Paint Chips!

(Editor's note: Each year, our guild holds a quilt challenge, with a unique theme and instructions. All members are encouraged to play. Participants compete for prizes and bragging rights. All the entries will be displayed as a group at our quilt show in October 2022.)

This year's challenge is paint chips. Choose two numbers between 1-40. Carrie has prepared envelopes numbered 1—40, and each envelope will contain a paint chip from a local hardware store. Your challenge is to use no less than two colors from each paint chip, in addition to one neutral.

Rules:

- Contact Carrie Townsend to choose your envelopes and your paint chips. (phone, text, email, stop by my house, etc.)
- * In addition to sending a photo of the paint chips to you, Carrie will mail also them.
- Use a minimum of 2 colors from each paint chip in the chosen shades. You can use solids or prints as long as they represent the color from the paint chip.
- * You can add only 1 neutral color to your project (background fabric counts as 1 neutral).
- * The project has to be 12" square, bound, and labeled by March 15th meeting deadline
- * Use any block pattern, applique pattern, original creation, etc. that you'd like as long as the colors are represented, and the project is quilted.
- No trading of paint chips between members, this is a challenge to get you out of your comfort zone.
- Save your paint chips for the big reveal at the general meeting on March 15th, 2022. Paint chips must be displayed along with the finished project.



For the past two years, I've been piecing on a kitchen table and cutting on a 20" wide credenza (yes, the mat hangs off the side and I can't cut past the 30" mark on the mat cuz the credenza has a combination lock on the top). It means taking the smaller of 2 upstairs rooms, but I won't have to hide everything (ironing board, iron, unfinished blocks, skads of thread spools and bobbins, dried out tea mugs) each time we have overnight guests. I'm taking suggestions for a design wall for really small spaces.
