First-Ever WQG Quilt-Along! Still Time to Join

The WQG All-Star Quilt Along began last month, and the patterns for the first two blocks went out in the Wednesday Patch on January 19th. Two new blocks will come out each month through June, for a total of twelve blocks. The blocks are all different stars, there are no blocks requiring templates, and they are all beginner/advanced beginner friendly. Sashing and layout are totally up to you.

By my calculation, you will need a *minimum* of 1.5 yards of background fabric for the blocks; you may use less (or more) depending on the techniques you use for half square triangles, etc. The 1.5 yards **DOES NOT** include fabric for sashing or borders. The goal is to have our quilts completed in September so that we can show at least some of them at the WQG Quilt Show in October.



There will be no Block of the Month during this timeframe - Deborah Bolton is taking a well-deserved break from the program!

Quilty Tips: Embellishing with Machine Stitching

Sometimes you just want a little "more" for a block, a bag or some other project. One way to do that is to use your machine's built-in stitches and some fun thread. These look spectacular on bags, small quilts, or other items you want to jazz up. You've got them; learn to use them.

Marking, Testing & Stabilizing: Mark the place you want to use the stitches. Use something that will be easily removed or use a seam to align your stitching. Make a test piece to try out what you want to do. That's important, so don't skip it. It should be the same fabrics, fusible, batting, backing or whatever is in the piece. It's a good idea to have some thickness/stability to your piece so that stitches will not draw up. Make the test piece large enough to try out several stitches and/or threads.

Thread and Needles: Your needle needs to be able to accommodate your thread, meaning the point and eye need to be sharp enough and large enough (or small enough) to handle the pretty thread you will use. Test the size of the eye by threading the needle while it's not in the machine and seeing if it slides easily through the eye. Have some fun using some different threads than the kind you use for piecing. Generally, I like to use a thicker thread, at least a 40 weight, but better yet is a 12 weight, and I've used metallics and even wool threads as well. In the bobbin, use a thinner thread in a color or neutral that will match or blend with the top thread.



Setting up the Machine: Selecting your stitch, widen or lengthen it to

make a desired impact. Try the tension on your test piece. If it is pulling the bobbin thread to the top, you will need to tighten the bottom thread and/or loosen the top tension. Tip: if you don't know which direction to go, check your buttonhole stitches and see what the tension is for those; that should get your close as those are designed to pull the top thread to the bottom a bit. If you are using a straight stitch, say for a top-stitching effect, lengthen your stitches a bit so there is more thread lying on the top.

Stitching: Once you're happy with the stitching on your test piece, start with your actual piece. Stitch a little slower; sometimes machines will not handle higher speeds when stitching decorative stitches.

Play! Have fun! Experiment and challenge yourself.

Guild Challenge Quilt: Paint Chips!

(Editor's note: Each year, our guild holds a quilt challenge, with a unique theme and instructions. All members are encouraged to play. Participants compete for prizes and bragging rights. All the entries will be displayed as a group at our quilt show in October 2022.)

This year's challenge is paint chips. Choose two numbers between 1-40. Carrie has prepared envelopes numbered 1—40, and each envelope will contain a paint chip from a local hardware store. Your challenge is to use no less than two colors from each paint chip, in addition to one neutral.

Rules:

- Contact Carrie Townsend to choose your envelopes and your paint chips. (phone, text, email, stop by my house, etc.)
- In addition to sending a photo of the paint chips to you, Carrie will also mail them.

Challenge Quilt Reveal is at the March 15th general meeting.

- * Use a **minimum** of 2 colors from **each** paint chip in the chosen shades. You can use solids or prints as long as they represent the color from the paint chip.
- * You can add only 1 neutral color to your project (background fabric counts as 1 neutral).
- * The project has to be 12" square, bound, and labeled by March 15th meeting deadline
- * Use any block pattern, applique pattern, original creation, etc. that you'd like as long as the colors are represented, and the project is quilted.
- * No trading of paint chips between members, this is a challenge to get you out of your comfort zone.
- Save your paint chips for the big reveal at the general meeting on March 15th, 2022. Paint chips must be displayed along with the finished project.

Many years ago, I met a marvelous elderly lady in the line at the register in a quilting shop. We immediately started talking about or fabric stashes. Borrow Our AccuQuilt Go!

Westside Quilters Guild AccuQuilt Go! Fabric Cutter

The Education Committee's set is available for loan for two weeks, renewable if not requested by another member.

System includes:

1. Cutter

2. Dies:

Strips – 2.5 inch and 3.5 inch

Shapes -4.5 inch square, 2.5 inch square, 2.5 inch HST finish at 2 inch, Flying Geese finishing at 3 inch x6 inch and applique hearts, flowers and stars in three sizes.

3. Cutting mats – extras are with the set but need to be replaced when worn

If you are using the system to cut out a whole quilt – queen or king, please plan on replacing the cutting mats. The maximum layers to be cut are 6-8 depending on the weight. If fabric has fusible web (for applique) the limit is 3-4. The cost of a mat is under \$50 for the strips (10×24) and \$19 for the shapes (5×10). Montavilla prices have been less compared to Amazon and the AccuQuilt website.

When the cuts are not good quality and/or threads are getting stuck in the mat, the mat needs to be replaced. If a mat is wearing in one area, it might still be used for another shape.

The dies must be stored FLAT – not on their edges, so a large plastic container is being used.

These are to be kept in the storage unit and can be loaned through the VP of Education.

They can be brought to sewing events if requested.

- Kate Grandusky: The Quilt Show with Alex Anderson has been the most enjoyable on line subscription. Her speakers and ideas are so inspiring. Lisa Thorpe's has beautiful fabric and creative art projects. Love that you can go back and rewatch programs.
- Joyce Greenfield: I am inspired most by other quilters I follow several quilters on various social media platforms, see projects in magazines and books, and at our guild show and tell. I especially like traditional quilts, or traditional quilts reinterpreted with a modern spin, and there are loads of blogs and newsletters available in that genre. Tech Tip: Organizing Your Quilt Books and Patterns

If you're like me, you have shelves of quilting books, craft reference books, how-to make all kinds of stuff books... the list can go on and on. Did you know that there are apps that can help you inventory those books and keep track of them? Why would you want to do this? Have you ever seen a technique demoed at guild, online or on tv and thought "Didn't I get that book?" Have you been at a yard sale, a guild sale, a bookstore or thrift store and picked up a great craft book and thought "Do I have this one?"

There are several apps to choose from, and you need to select one that works with your device and that appeals to how you like to organize and search for things. Some apps allow you to simply scan the barcode with your phone and it takes care of the rest, filing away the pertinent data. You can create different book shelves for different genres; of course, you're not limited to only keeping craft books in the database! You can also create a wish list for books you hope to find, upcoming publications, etc.

Find out more about this topic by doing an online search for "apps to keep track of books" and read up about a few - perhaps you'll find one that works for you!
